

School-wide update from Gabe Pethtel, head of school

ur school's theme verse for 2022-23 is **Galatians** 5:22-23. "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Against such things there is no law."

Galatians 5:22-23 provides an excellent framework in which to develop our chapel and small group experiences for our PreK-12 students this school year, as we can dedicate an entire month of the school year to each aspect of the fruit mentioned. For example, in the month of September, we are focusing on biblical love. While we focus on teaching our students about how God can help them develop the fullness of the Fruit of the Spirit in their lives, it is imperative that we as an entire learning community at Intermountain Christian School (ICS) dedicate ourselves to seeking to reflect Jesus Christ. We must ask God to develop a fullness of the Fruit of the Spirit in our lives as administrators, teachers, coaches, students, and parents. We know that our students are looking to our example for direction.

As a Christian educator, and as a husband and father, I am well aware that life can be very busy; our work and family needs can quickly fill our entire calendar with important tasks and events. In times like these, we can feel stressed and drained and that the opposite of the Fruit of the Spirit is developing in our lives. But God in his infinite mercy reaches out to us through his great love, to let us know that, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness. Therefore, we will boast all the more gladly about our weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on each of us." (2 Corinthians 12:9)

In our own power, we do not have the ability to grow all areas of the Fruit of the Spirit to fullness. Still, through the amazing grace of Jesus Christ who died on the cross for our sins, we can trust and pray that God, who is rich in mercy, will fully grow us. Then we can be witnesses for Christ in a way that will strongly lead our lives and our relationships, including those within our school community. Please join me in praying for the Fruit of the Spirit to graciously and fully develop in our lives and in the lives of our children.

This year, we enter year two of our work with Teaching for Transformation (TfT). Our goal is to help our administration, teachers, and students to develop common language and goals leading ICS to become more and more the people of God's story, engaged in real work that forms the self and shapes the world.

TfT places an important emphasis on the power of story, a compelling vision of the Kingdom that connects our learners and their learning to God's greater story throughout history. As your new Head of School, I have been meeting weekly with ICS parents and friends for coffee to get to know their hearts for our learning community and to let them know more about the mission and vision of our school as we follow God's lead. One area of ICS development that I enjoy sharing during these meetings includes our TfT Throughlines. Our TfT Throughlines are specific areas of learning that express ways in which we as a community would like to focus student learning through all grade levels and subject areas.

TfT Throughlines for ICS students include focusing our students on becoming God Worshipers, Idolatry Discerners, Creation Enjoyers, Beauty Creators, Order Discoverers, Justice Seekers, Servant Workers,

Earth Keepers, Community Builders, and Image Reflectors. Of course, all of these focus us on the multifaceted nature of our God through the person of our Savior, Jesus Christ. While attaining mastery in all of these throughlines is a tall order, I believe that as our administrators, teachers, and parents pursue these throughlines in our daily lives alongside our students, we as a Christian learning community will see God do more than all we can ask or imagine in and through Intermountain Christian School.

My Deep Hope for our ICS learning community is that administrators, teachers, students, and parents would unify in prayer and purpose to enhance joy and wonder throughout our school so that our students will be equipped and inspired to love and serve Jesus Christ and thrive in God's world. Thank you for your support and prayers as we endeavor to take this journey together at Intermountain Christian School.

he ICS Fine Arts Department boasts strong leadership and ample opportunities for our students to develop and showcase their Godgiven talents in the 2022-23 school year.

Tess Tally has directed 15 plays at Intermountain Christian School during her tenure. This fall, the Theater Department has the opportunity to go to the Utah Shakespeare Festival in Cedar City. High school theater students, who had to audition to participate in this special weekend, will perform for professional adjudicators, participate in workshops, and watch professional productions.

Mrs. Tally's goals for this school year include having more varsity shows with more challenging music. She also plans to bring back a mainstage show which is open to Grades 3-12; younger students interested in theater will be able to participate in the Wizard of Oz production. In addition, each theater class will have a production throughout the school year. Conservatory will be putting on Godspell and will take the show on the road to different locations in the spring. ADDING UP THE MATH DEPARTMENT

ICS welcomes Brewster Christiansen, K-12 Math Department chair

rewster Christiansen originally walked the halls of ICS as a student, graduating in 2002. Mr. Christiansen returns to Intermountain Christian School as the K-12 Math Department chair with decades of mathematical instruction experience. Mr. Christiansen is taking a holistic approach to math and will be involved to some extent with math in all grades at ICS. He will work through a process called vertical teaming, partnering with teachers from all grades to assure seamless transitions from grade to grade in the study of math.

Mr. Christiansen hopes to see an interest in math grow all the way up through 12th grade. Elementary teachers can look for gaps in mathematical comprehension and work to bridge those gaps, improving the student body's fluency in math skills. An ICS education allows differentiation for math beginning in 8th grade. Students can choose to take Math 8 or Algebra I during their 8th grade year. This allows students to be challenged and develop a deeper understanding of math facts and concepts, preparing them for their high school years. As students continue through each grade level at ICS, he hopes that more high school students will choose to push beyond Utah state standards and take a math course their senior year.

Mr. Christiansen has set goals for the Math Department which can be measured over time through increase standardized test scores, both on the national and local levels. He says that math is an important part of life — because beyond learning facts, math can extend into other areas of learning. Math requires critical thinking, problem solving, and logical thinking. All areas of academia require these skills. A strong Math Department will lead to a strong Science Department, and so on.

Mr. Christiansen is already showing his dedication to providing excellence in Christian education at ICS through mathematics. ICS

is confident that the Math Department will challenge and encourage students to look beyond the calculator and understand the importance of math — in and out of the classroom!



TFT CONTINUES!

■his summer, I was asked to speak at one of our alumni events, and it was such a challenge to decide what to share! I have so many great memories of ICS, from a variety of perspectives. As a parent, I am incredibly grateful that my kids have attended (or still attend!) ICS; to have them at a place with excellent teachers who also pray for them has been priceless. As an employee, I have loved working at ICS. As the guidance counselor I basked in the joys of helping kids make plans for their futures — both the years when the graduating class was 10 and the years when we had big classes of 26. Each one was special. As an administrator, I have been blessed to lead an excellent team of teachers. I am in awe of the gifted, committed professionals God brings to our staff.

After pondering so many excellent memories, I decided that what best sums up my memories is my Deep Hope for Intermountain Christian School.

For the past several years, we have been preparing to bring Teaching for Transformation (TfT) to our school. We began by testing the waters of this program theoretically; then we invited some teachers to try it out

as our early adopters. This year, all of our faculty will be involved with TfT. In a nutshell. TfT combines intentional biblical integration with educational best practices. In full transparency, I started as a skeptic: I have been an educator for 20+ years and have seen so many programs come and go. I am no longer apt to trust the latest new idea. But I have become a huge fan of TfT; it is rich with biblical integration and strong educational protocols. TfT is going to add great things to our school.



As part of Teaching for Transformation, each person on

staff is asked to construct a written Deep Hope for our work at ICS. This Deep Hope is our guiding principle of sorts — the "why" of what we do. Our Deep Hope represents why we each followed the call to work in a Christian school.

My Deep Hope for ICS is to be a school where — in all areas — learners are challenged to see themselves as part of God's Great Story. May we, as the ICS community, see our own part in that story and know deeply how much He cares for, equips, and calls us to His purpose.

Though written for this coming school year, these lines represent what I have always desired for ICS: to be a place where seeking God's purpose and plan is paramount. As a parent, and as an educator, I want ICS to be strong in what we offer academically and equally as strong in what we offer spiritually. We need to be a place where — in addition to math, science, and humanities — students learn about God, His story, and how each of us fits into His grand, purposeful plans.

STEM AT EVERY LEVEL

ICS launches a school-wide STEM program

ntermountain Christian School is excited to embrace a STEM program for students from PreK through 12th grade. STEM is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math education. It is an interdisciplinary approach that helps students succeed in college and in their future careers. The focus of a STEM education is hands-on, problem-based learning. At ICS, we have the unique opportunity to focus on STEM through a biblical lens.

The STEM team at ICS includes Dana Pethtel, Daniel Hildebrand, and Michelle Reed. Mrs. Pethtel has joined ICS as the STEM program coordinator for grades PreK-5. Mrs. Pethtel comes with vast classroom experience and an educational background which enable her to lead the classroom in creative, unique ways. Connecting a STEM program with biblical, Christ-centered learning is fun for Mrs. Pethtel. She will draw from biblical stories to bring engineering and math to life. For example, the Tower of Babel serves as a great biblical STEM lesson. Mrs. Pethtel plans to have her students build their own tower with their own materials, going through the engineering process. Students will work through the project by drawing and writing each part with their classmates. At some point during the building process, the students will no longer be able to communicate with each other, of course causing frustration. The bridge Pethtel is able to build between STEM concepts and biblical stories sets ICS apart.

Mr. Hildebrand has coached LEGO® and robotics teams for over five years at various schools. At ICS, he hopes for his robotics class to advance in multiple tournaments for the middle school-level LEGO® robotics. This will be the second year of the program, and Mr. Hildebrand is confident the team will advance further than the inaugural year. Mr. Hildebrand is also offering the high school elective AP Computer Science. Through teaching STEM, he is confident that students will reflect the Creator's greatness and providence by creating innovative solutions to real people's needs.

Ms. Reed holds her PhD in neuroscience from the University of Utah. Ms. Reed says STEM education is important because it is a good space for students to learn how to think critically, creatively, and wisely. She hopes that skill will overflow into whatever they're truly passionate about. Critical thinking is important to utilize whether one chooses a STEM career path or not. Ms. Reed's middle school class, The ABC's of STEM, was recently seen outside shooting rubber bands to measure distance and speed. STEM learning is not only important — it's also fun!

ICS looks forward to a successful year of school-wide STEM projects. The entire student body will benefit from this integral and FUN way of learning.
