Why is the Speech and Debate program so successful at Intermountain Christian School? As I asked this question to our Speech and Debate coach, Mrs. Croswhite, you would have thought the reasons would be too numerous to list, however, she redirected the con-

versation back to the students. She gave example after ex-

ample of current students in her program and the successes of those who have graduated. I sat there waiting for her to list off what she, our top-ranked Speech and Debate coach, does to make our program the best, and the longer I sat there waiting, the clearer it became. The success of the Speech and Debate program is not necessarily about the high intelligence of the students (although that doesn't hurt), but it is the way each student is valued as an individual.

The Speech and Debate program began as a student-driven elective in 2002 and that is how it continues - as a culture of discipleship. This culture of discipleship in the Speech and Debate program is where encouragement between students and hard work ethic equals success. 2015 Utah Speech Educator of the Year, our own Mrs. Croswhite teaches with the philosophy that recognizes how God has created each student individually and embraces their God-given talent as they develop in her classroom. "The traditional philosophy says that certain events are better than others and the student needs to

conform to those events. I disagree with that philosophy. I look at each student and their gifts and then cater the events to them, individually." This is what makes Intermountain Christian School's Speech and Debate program stand out and wildly successful. Mrs. Croswhite pushes each student to be their best and does not allow

them to get away with anything less. "I set high standards and then I bend over backward to get them there."

Mrs. Croswhite has 20+ years of teaching experience and as she equips our ICS students, she inspires each one of them to thrive beyond the four walls of ICS. In February, I had lunch with John and Dawn and asked them about their experience. They expressed the joy of being back at ICS and how they are here to stay! I went on to explain the things we're working on as a school, especially via the initiatives of our strategic plan. They were pleasantly surprised by the improvement initiatives as they were already excited about what ICS currently is.

A vital component to the pursuit of excellence is a commitment to continuous improvement. Below are two new improvements we are implementing next school year.

NEW ELEMENTARY GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM FOR 2019-2020

Katy McCombs is our current 1st grade teacher. When she was contemplating what she wanted to study in her Master's program, she considered our strategic plan that mentions "Better Meeting the Needs of High Achieving Students." So Mrs. McCombs went all-in and focused her study in Gifted and Talented Education. After considering how that can be done at ICS, we are very ex-

cited to announce that we will launch the ICS Elementary Gifted and Talented Program this coming fall. Katy will spend a portion of her day dedicated to working with other teachers, incorporating strategies into their classrooms, and identifying and spending time with students for specific activities that will better inspire their learning. We are thrilled to pilot this program in Elementary Education and hope to expand it to other levels of the school in the coming years.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT PROGRAM

Since adopting our mission statement in 2015, we pour every aspect of ICS through our mission of being a Christcentered learning community that equips and inspires students to thrive in God's world. Due to this, we saw the opportunity to develop a modest, but welldone international program as a way to enhance our students' educations. The International Program will be directed by Jacqueline Croswhite with assistance from Jennifer Adema. We are looking forward to primarily bringing in high school students from outside the US beginning next year. The number of students, by design, would not exceed 10% of our student body and we hope to place them individually with ICS host families. Early applications and inquiries have come from Vietnam, Ivory Coast, Chile and China.

If you know Dawn and John, welcome them back! Also know that in our desire to pursue our mission, we are always looking for ways to improve on the excellence that is the private Christian education of ICS.

BEHIND THE SCENES

But with a cast and crew of close to 50, the familiar story and characters came to life nicely on our small stage, and the production had a more elegant feel and a timeless quality.

It was a thrill to see my vision of the wardrobe entrance into the theatre come to life, thanks to the artistic efforts of Romana Brown and other generous parents. I really wanted the audience to be swept away into Narnia, walking through the wardrobe, past the coats and encountering the pine trees throughout the theater. The volunteer ushers promoted the idea by gathering several audience members outside of our wardrobe doors and asking them if they were ready to enter Narnia, similar to being on a guided tour at Disneyland. The onstage wardrobe was a find and actually fit all four children, some of whom were very tall! With the

addition of other key set pieces and the use of multi-media, we were able to tell the story in a very intimate space. The costuming was beautiful and the unsung heroine in both of this year's theater productions would have to be Ms. Mary Campbell. Her vision and tireless work brought our shows to a higher level. The cast truly came to life once they put on Ms. Mary's costumes.

The heart of the show was the cast and crew, working hard on timing, dialects, physicality, memorization, and lots of plain waiting until it was time for their respective entrances. When we were working on the battle scene, told through the stage convention of "Tableaux Vivant," the intensity of the frozen poses really drove the emotions home for the performers. Using no dialogue, they had to freeze in different battle poses - good versus evil - both sides intense and determined. And when Aslan came back to life. performers, techies, and audience members alike sensed the joy and hope and saw the story of resurrection told in a new light.

Sharing this beautiful story with our community was worth every minute of prep, running, rehearsing, etc. But the best part was hearing our students faithfully pray before every performance, "We want to bring You glory."



EXPANDING OPPORTUNITIES WITH GIFTED AND TALENTED EDUCATION

Katy McCombs has been with ICS for two years and will receive her Master's in Gifted and Talented Education in December of 2019. Her presence at ICS and in the classroom with our students is of immense benefit in that, as the students grow, they will reap tremendous reward to impact the world around them. Utilizing the gifted and talented approach to teaching expands opportunities for children, benefiting every student, even the ones that in the traditional classroom would be identified as "falling behind."

Here are 5 ways the gifted and talented approach benefits students:

1. DIFFERENTIATION

Gifted and Talented Education emphasizes variety- teaching which takes into account students' abilities and interests. Using differentiation is taking a broader approach to learning. Differentiating between content, processes, the learning environment, and product creation brings different opportunities and perspectives to students.



2. INDIVIDUALIZED LEARNING

Gifted and Talented Education means teachers meet students where they are and then pushes them to learn more. Making a path for the learner to follow means that the teacher has an idea of where the students can go if properly led. Gifted and talented students can be motivated by making a new learning discovery that is further than where they might naturally go on their own.



3. ADAPTABLE BUT STRUCTURED

The gifted and talented learning journey is intended to take students deeper into more complex thinking. Walking up the path of Bloom's Taxonomy and reaching across the Levels in Webb's Depth of Knowledge is how deeper, more complex learning takes place. When combining these methods, it has the added benefit of preparing students for the kind of questions asked in standardized testing. Yet at the same time, students and teachers must remain flexible in their studies. If teachers have the knowledge to adapt their lessons to optimize student engagement, it ensures that all students have a better learning experience. Adaptable teaching reaches more students.

4. PROJECT-BASED AND PROBLEM-BASED LEARNING

This is where students learn how to think through a situation and reach a solution. These group projects promote teamwork, reward "out of the box" thinking, and help students to connect what might seem like disparate ideas. Problem and project-based learning lends itself to working through real-world scenarios that have real-life opportunities connected to them. This is a great place to be innovative!

5. GOING BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

Students need to be introduced to enriching outside resources. We want to think past the end of the school day, school year, and school career of a student and look forward to what's ahead. Gifted students have big potential for having highly-influential roles and careers, and they need to be introduced to possibilities in the world and challenged by

witnessing excellence around them. The world needs our gifted students to reach their full potential to be Christ-like and wise influencers.

"Pray, listen, and take every opportunity you can to let God show you what He has planned for your life, even if it is something you wouldn't expect.

I knew early into my time at ICS that I wanted to go to law school but wasn't sure what I wanted to do with my law degree. The rest of my family went into medi-

As a lot of first-year law students do, I applied to dozens of jobs, including the Utah Attor-

ney General's Office. I originally applied for a position with the Criminal Appeals Division but got placed in the Family Justice Division on the Internet Crimes Against Children team. At first, I was disappointed I was not placed with my preferred division, but I trusted that God placed me there for a reason and accepted the position. Now,

three years later, I still work on the Internet Crimes Against Children team and know that this is where I am meant to be. I work with the best group of people who are all committed to protecting children, and I get to come to work every day knowing that I am helping to protect society's most innocent and vulnerable. I feel honored and blessed knowing God chose a career of advocating for children as my plan and my calling."

BIBLICAL INTEGRATION

In the world of education there are many schools that are Christian in name only – essentially public schools with a Bible class. ICS is not such a school. We strive every day to fully integrate a Christian worldview into every subject. As a history teacher, this biblical integration is why I teach. History is a pointless collection of stories without a Creator God guiding its events.

Let me be clear about what biblical integration is not. It is not a bunch of Bible trivia, a list of alternative facts, a watering down of history, or a way of making excuses for bad behavior by Christians, Western Civilization, or the United States through the years. Instead, it begins with an understanding that history is the account of what man has done with the time that God has given him. God is the author and hero of the story. Man's role is one of a supporting actor with two choices: to honor God or to follow his own selfish desires.

For me personally, I use a variety of ways to integrate a biblical worldview into my curriculum. We begin every class with prayer. Students can view a bulletin board timeline prominently displayed in the room that shows the sequence of



"biblical" and "secular" events in history side by side. Additionally, I am deeply grateful for the undergraduate training I received at Pensacola Christian College where the whole focus of the education program is to teach with excellence from a biblical worldview. When preparing for lecture, I use the secular textbooks given to me by ICS as well as biblical worldview textbooks from Abeka Book Publishing

and have students take notes instead of taking the secular texts at face value. I am blessed to work at a school where biblical integration is not only allowed but also encouraged every day and in every way.
