MUSIC TOUR 2022

Before August 2022, the last time I was in a school, I was a student. A nervous wreck, I entered ICS on my first day, a teacher. I handed out the syllabus to my first class and shakingly asked if there were any questions. Several hands shot up, and the question was asked, as if no other questions mattered, "Is there going to be a Tour this year?" All other hands went down.

ICS Music Tour is a long standing, dearly cherished, highly anticipated tradition at ICS. I remember answering that student with an emphatic "yes!" all the while having no idea what "Music Tour" actually meant. So I started my research. I spent a handful of class periods discussing with students their most memorable moments and their favorite traditions. I attended several meetings trying to understand the financial and schedule constraints. I looked up prior year's plans and yet I still struggled to find a way to clearly define what ICS's annual Music Tour actually was. So, with the little bit of knowledge I had acquired, a phenomenal co-planner, Amy Florell, and the tiniest bit of hope, we created something, having no idea if it would live up to the expectations of this beloved tradition.

This year, Tour was designed with two priorities in mind: service and connection. The first two days of Tour were spent serving our local community. Sunday we performed for the Rescue Mission and Valley Behavioral Health, where we were able to hold an intimate, sensory-friendly concert for those who might struggle to attend a larger event. On Monday, we hosted a music therapy program where our own pre-kindergarteners and a group of individuals with various disabilities were invited to attend (pictured right). As we researched and planned the event, we discovered that there was much we did not know or understand about people living with disabilities and their families. The biggest insight we gained is that their community is grossly undeserved. Many people misunderstand or are unsure of how to interact around people with disabilities and many facilities and families lack the resources and knowledge to adequately accommodate them. As we held our event, I looked around and observed my students connecting, including, and empowering other human beings using something they





loved, music. As one of my students so eloquently summarized the experience, "On Tours in the past, we would always have to leave the people we made connections with and wait a year to show love to them again. That was so painful. We don't have to do that anymore, because the people we connected with this week are right here in our own hometown." This community is one that I hope to continue to serve through Music Tour and other ICS music events.

The second two days were used to explore how we could use music to connect with each other, with ourselves, and with God. We played several games that pushed us out of our comfort zone, including a musical TikTok challenge. Needless to say, I have some incriminating evidence for how hilarious these students can be. We took time to worship together and allowed a couple of local pastors to speak into our lives. But even with all these special moments, there is still one I have yet to let you in on. I challenged the kids to get vulnerable, to get honest, and to get creative in a songwriting session. Imagine with me. You are in a large cabin with big glass windows and vaulted ceilings. The snow is falling outside and a tea kettle is heating on the stove. In one corner, a girl is humming and pauses to write out a lyric. A young man is strumming the guitar on a couch, while a piano is being learned in another corner. Someone else is editing loops on their laptop, while others retreat to a secluded place to write or sing out their thoughts. The last evening, several students were brave enough to perform their work. During many of the songs, there wasn't a dry eye in the room. In just a few phrases and with a whole lot of vulnerability, we were able to glorify our God, empathize with our peers, and understand one another on a deeper level.

So, I survived my first Music Tour. How fortunate I am to lead this amazing group of students. After all this, I still can't describe to you what it means to experience an ICS Music Tour. However, I can define why ICS's Music Tour is so unique. Music is the tool we use, the commonality we each hold, both with our peers and our audiences. Tour is the journey God takes us on as we take the time to serve His beloved, lean into those around us, and learn what next steps He calls us to faithfully walk with Him.

TEACHING FOR TRANSFORMATION

Sounds great... but what does it really mean?

f you have been in our ICS hallways, you cannot help but hear about *Teaching for Transformation* (TfT). We have pictures showing TfT **Throughlines**, classrooms with TfT **Deep Hope** posters, and students who have been involved in TfT FLEx experiences. This all sounds intriguing...but what does it mean?

Teaching for Transformation is designed to combine excellent educational practices with an intentional Kingdom mindset. In other words, kids get to learn really well while also understanding their individual role in God's story. Here are some TfT components that highlight the richness of this program.

TfT learning begins with a **Deep Hope.** Each teacher will pray and think through their **Deep Hope** for themselves and their students and answer the question: what is the purpose and calling of my classroom to help students see and live God's story? Mr. Hulin is one of our TfT Early Adopters*. As he teaches physical education at ICS, his Deep Hope is this: My **Deep Hope** for myself and my students is that our responses and actions brought out by sports and competition point others to Christ as we care for our bodies through exercise.

Next, teachers develop a **Storyline** for their classroom, a statement that uses our school's Throughlines to connect their Deep Hope to a compelling vision of God's kingdom. Storylines connect learners and learning to God's story. Mrs. Harmon's **Storyline** is God is >. He is greater than hard math problems, greater than personal challenges, and greater than anything that seems to hold us back. This Storyline connects to her **Deep Hope:** What if my students discover that they are uniquely equipped and capable of doing

hard things? I hope they are always curious and continually seek to find how they fit into God's story.

Throughlines are "Habits of Living" that we desire our students to embody. They include things like Servant Working; Community Building; Earth Keeping; and Justice Seeking. These ideas run through every part of our curriculum and help our students to reflect Jesus. TfT also employs Habits of Learning, including Curious Thinking, Gracious Communicating, Joy-Filled Collaboration, and Courageous Designing. These concepts work in tandem to build students' minds and character.

Another key practice of TfT involves Formational **Learning Experiences**. These FLEx opportunities ask students to engage in real work that meets the real needs of real people. Teachers invite students to use their skills, then nurture and empower them to tackle real-life problems. The FLEx opportunities allow students to practice Habits of Learning and Habits of Living!

An example of a FLEx is Miss Potter's challenge to her students to consider how God has made each of them one of a kind, meeting the real need of respecting themselves and others. In conjunction with our English Language Arts curriculum, the third grade read about personal uniqueness and focused on Jesus- the One who is truly one of a kind! They observed a unique piece of art on a field trip and then created their own piece of art to reflect how Jesus made them one of a kind on purpose. Next, they wrote essays about how God has gifted them. Finally, they presented their learning to the seniors, sharing the important message that God has made each of us unique and on purpose!



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There is much more to TfT, and we will continue to keep you updated as we embark on this exciting educational and biblical journey. Please stop by my office anytime if you have questions or want to learn more about Teaching for Transformation!

With all six senior varsity starters back on the court, we were a different team which allowed for game-altering momentum and runs. y journey with scoliosis began my freshman year, when the sideways curve in my spine had

progressed to 38°. I was referred to a spinal specialist at Primary Children's Hospital and learned I needed to wear a custom-made, plastic, uncomfortable brace for 16 hours a day in an attempt to stop the curve progression as I grew (pictured right). After almost a year of bracing treatment, I was released from bracing as my curve had only progressed to 39°. My back developed chronic pain my sophomore year from my spine pulling at muscles and nerves, but I was happy to be done with bracing. In August of this year, however, I learned my back had gotten worse, against the odds. My curve was now 49°, past the degree of recommended surgery. I would need an extensive and very painful spinal fusion which would include two metal rods, 13 screws, and two hooks to fuse my spine. This would also come with a year-long recovery. My world turned upside down at this news, and I was terrified.


I would not have been able to face my surgery if it weren't for my friends, peers, teachers, mentors, family, and God. The prayers and letters I received from those around me reminded me that even when I do not feel strong enough for trials, He is. Recovery has been the hardest thing I have ever had to do, but it taught me that I can get through anything I put my mind to. I am confident that God can turn anything for good. For example, my scoliosis journey has inspired me to raise awareness and become passionate about implementing scoliosis screenings in schools. Screenings are vital because early detection is key to avoiding what I had to go through. The earlier scoliosis is caught, the sooner bracing or other treatment can be utilized to increase the chances of avoiding surgery and progression. I am also passionate about spreading awareness online through my scoliosis Instagram account, while also being a mentor in a program to give advice to younger girls going through bracing or surgery.

ICS has supported me in more ways than I could have imagined. I have grown more than I dreamed possible, like learning how to love and be patient with my body, take action for what I care about, and to lean on and trust God.

Teachers willingly took extra time to help me stay caught up in school. Countless meals were provided for our family as I was in the hospital and recovering. Friends were always available to offer a prayer or a hug. ICS has supported me in more ways than I could have imagined. I have grown more than I dreamed possible, like learning how to love and be patient with my body, take action for what I care about, and to lean on and trust God.

Ihen Intermountain Christian School opened in 1982, it was a kindergarten through 9th grade school with a student body totaling 122. The second year grew to include pre-k through 11th grades. As ICS turns 40 this year, the school celebrates four decades of God's faithfulness. This year, the student body numbers 293 and will graduate 26 seniors in May. ICS has had 30 years in a beloved school building that we moved into in 1991, a move that many alumni will remember helping with in October of that year. The school said goodbye to 10 years in the "Fortuna Flying Saucer" with its circular racetracks, otherwise known as hallways, and said hello to the new 47,000 sq. ft. building that ICS rents from Evangelical Free Church of Salt Lake City. It was the culmination of nearly seven years of prayer, planning, hoping, giving, negotiating, cajoling, sweating, and sacrificing for the future of the school. God's grace provided and the alumni numbers now include over 600 graduates!

When ICS opened its doors, there were high hopes to provide exemplary education in academics, athletics, fine arts, and community outreach. There have been many successes in all these areas. ICS has produced many plays over the years starting with the first 'real' play: "Our Town" in 1986. Other shows include "Charlotte's Web" in 1994 and this year's theater program will wrap up with "The Little Shop of Horrors." Music Tour has been a long-standing tradition at ICS, leading to many memories and successful trips. Intermountain Christian School has had many students represented in the Utah All-State High School Art Show, including this year. There have also been State Tournament runs in cross country, baseball, girls volleyball, boys basketball, girls basketball, speech and debate, boys soccer, girls soccer and track. This year, the teams achieved two state championships in HS Girls Volleyball and HS Speech and Debate. ICS has always strived to be one of the highest academic

achieving schools in Utah and with a current SAT average of 1280 and ACT average of 27, the standard continues to be met. Intermountain Christian School has truly built upon its foundation of God's love.

ICS will be hosting an Alumni Weekend, August 5th and 6th. All past graduates are invited to spend the weekend reconnecting with each other and celebrating 40 years of Intermountain Christian School. There will be time for alumni to reconnect over conversation, sports, a family picnic, and a formal dinner. Special guest speakers representing the last 40 years of ICS will be on hand to entertain us with memories from their time at the school. Mr. Bob Payne fulfilled many roles on faculty and administration at our school from 1982 – 1996. Mr. Bill Postma was part of the faculty from 1995 – 2002. Mr. John Gutman and Mrs. Sally Gutman were both on faculty for periods between 1990 and 2003. Mrs. Andrea Townsend was part of the faculty between 1993 – 2005. Mrs. Denise Buckley has been part of our school's staff since 2017 and 2003 – 2012 before that. Mrs. Becky Schumacher has been part of the faculty since 2015. You don't want to miss this event!
